

## CLARIFICATION

Carl Ross, who was profiled in the Spring 2006 issue of *The Watershed* (“Practical politics for tree lovers”), would like to clarify a statement in that profile.

Ross was talking of a particular kind of destructive logging when he said (on page 7) “With all we know about nature and with all we know about the negative aspects of this kind of crazy behavior, logging on our public lands should end. And it will end when our Save America’s Forests act becomes law.”

He would like to point out that the Act to Save America’s Forests would severely limit logging on public lands, but not end it entirely.

“More precisely, the Act would end logging in Ancient Forests and roadless areas and other designated areas,” Ross says. “It would end clearcutting in the rest of the national forests, but it would allow limited amounts of selection logging in those areas, as long as that logging did not harm the native biodiversity.”
